

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Founded in 2015, Light Up Learning is a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation (SC045701) providing one-to-one mentoring for young people aged thirteen to eighteen across Edinburgh and the Lothians. We are dedicated to igniting a love of learning in young people and transforming the nature of education in Scotland. We aim to address issues of unequal access to education and disengagement in the classroom by creating low-stress, supportive, and playful learning environments for young people who have experienced disadvantage. We encourage students to pursue their own interests and curiosities and place them in charge of their own learning. We help them develop the resources, skills, and contacts they need to achieve their potential.

## THE NUMBERS

Over the reporting period:



SIX SCHOOLS

We increased our student numbers from **57 to 77** across the year.

We worked in a total of **6 schools** during the year. As well as continuing our work in Lasswade High School, Castlebrae Community High School, Armadale Academy, Wester Hailes High School and Leith Academy, we also started working with James Gillespie's High School in February 2022.






#### **THE TEACHERS**




**94%** of mentees are more confident according to teachers

**83.3%** of mentees have displayed a positive change in their behaviour in the classroom\*


#### **THE MENTEES**




The average score students gave for how much they enjoy learning with Light Up Learning was **4.5/5**

**84.2%** of students said that Light Up Learning helped break down barriers to learning


#### **CORE SKILLS**

While all our students might be studying different topics, there are many common transferable skills that our mentees develop through learning about the things that interest them. This year we asked mentees to think about the 'core skills' that LUL has helped them develop. We narrowed this down to 8 key skills: communication, research skills, confidence, debating, practical skills, artistic skills, teamwork and leadership.

Using the list of 'core skills', we are building opportunities for students to reflect on their own learning and the progress they have made. Not only does this help students build confidence in their own abilities, but also helps them set challenges at the start of each term and think about the skills they would like to build on in their sessions.

At the end of the 21/22 school year we asked all of our students to identify the core skills they felt they had developed when working with their mentor and these were the results:

#### **CAITLIN'S STORY**

Caitlin was originally referred to Light up Learning to help her to develop more confidence in her abilities and think about her future. Caitlin has enjoyed exploring topics which fall outside of the school curriculum, and recently completed a very advanced essay on Attachment Theory: "I learned about psychology and then linked it to the tv show, Friends, because I'd watched it a lot. So I did an analysis of the characters to see what they're like based on the information I know about attachment theory". Exploring this topic has helped her shape her future plans and she has decided that "I'm interested in doing child psychology. I want to study psychology after school".

After being with LUL for two years Caitlin has been able to take on more responsibilities and leadership roles as a Youth Ambassador, including assisting with finding new mentors for the organisation by conducting interviews with potential candidates. When asked about this she said: "Probably two years ago I would

have been like 'no I'm not doing it", but being with LUL has changed her attitude and now she feels more confident about trying new things. Her mentor, Katie, has also noticed Caitlin's confidence, and told her that: "The growth in your confidence is unbelievable. You do try new things, you are really up for trying anything. Whether it's reading, researching something, even getting stuck into an essay".

When asked about what she felt Light Up Learning had helped her with the most, Caitlin had this to say: "When you're learning in LUL, you're figuring out what you want to do, learning with help from somebody else, doing stuff you wouldn't normally do. Before if I was stuck on anything I would just ask the teacher or stay stuck. Now I can try to figure out things by using research". LUL has also helped Caitlin change her mind about learning more generally: "Before Light Up Learning it was just something I had to do, it was kind of boring. I wasn't really interested in it. It was quite forced. Whereas now, it can be fun and different."

"Learning isn't just something you have to do in school and is forced into your brain to make you better at doing stuff. It's something that happens throughout one's life and I really enjoyed learning in a different way".


#### YOUTH AMBASSADORS

At Light Up Learning, it is important that young people are at the forefront in everything we do. In addition to their weekly mentoring sessions, this year 17 students took on extra responsibilities within the organisation as part of the launch of our Youth Ambassador programme. This replaces our Youth Forum in order to allow us to involve students across the wider geographical area we are now working in. We offer students opportunities to get involved in a leadership role in lots of different ways, from acting as youth consultants for organisational decisions, interviewing candidates who have applied to become mentors, assisting with staff training, and introducing younger students to the programme.

Next year we have exciting plans to expand this programme and offer additional ways for students to develop their leadership skills within the organisation. As one of our Ambassadors says: "It is so unique to let a student come to the behind-the-scenes meetings. It's really great and shows that LUL is genuinely about the mentees. They aren't trying to hide anything. It is student-led."





"One third-year student was referred to Light Up Learning due to poor attendance, anxieties, and a general lack of motivation. I have noticed that since starting mentoring sessions the student has a more positive attitude to school and seems happier generally. They also are making more effort to get to school on time and I think feel like they belong more to the school community. They seem more motivated to learn and are starting to see a purpose to school and developing new skills and knowledge".

"The main difference for me is that before I didn't enjoy school. I was bored with it, I just wanted to leave. But now I'm moving to S6. Light Up Learning gives you a break from traditional learning and you can learn what you want to learn. In school you can only do limited research and you don't have so many choices. Light Up Learning mentoring takes the pressure off, there are no tests. You can go really in depth into what you want to learn about".
